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

### **Parent's Introduction**

Welcome to **We Read Phonics**! This series is designed to help you assist your child in reading. Each book includes a story, as well as some simple word games to play with your child. The games focus on the phonics skills and sight words your child will use in reading the story.

# Here are some recommendations for using this book with your child:

### Word Play

There are word games both before and after the story. Make these games fun and playful. If your child becomes bored or frustrated, play a different game or take a break.



**Phonics** is a method of sounding out words by blending together letter sounds. However, not all words can be "sounded out." **Sight words** are frequently used words that usually cannot be sounded out.


### Read the Story

After some word play, read the story aloud to your child—or read the story together, by reading aloud at the same time or by taking turns. As you and your child read, move your finger under the words.

Next, have your child read the entire story to you while you follow along with your finger under the words. If there is some difficulty with a word, either help your child to sound it out or wait about five seconds and then say the word.

### 3 Discuss and Read Again

After reading the story, talk about it with your child. Ask questions like, "What happened in the story?" and "What was the best part?" It will be helpful for your child to read this story to you several times. Another great way for your child to practice is by reading the book to a younger sibling, a pet, or even a stuffed animal!





**Level 5** introduces words with "ai" and "ay" with the long "a" sound (as in *bait* and *day*), "igh," "y," and "ie" with the long "i" sound (as in *high*, *cry*, and *tied*), and the "ng" sound (as in *song* and *king*). Also included are the word endings -er and -ing (as in *higher* and *running*).

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

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## **Phonics** Game

# Alphabet

Creating words using certain letter combinations will help your child read this story.



#### **Materials:**

2

Option 1—Fast and Easy: To print the game materials from your computer, go online to www.WeReadPhonics.com, then go to this book title and click on the link to "View & Print: Game Materials." Or, if this book PDF came on a disk, open and print the "Game Materials" PDF for this title.

Option 2—Make Your Own: You'll need paper or cardboard, markers, a small cooking pot and a stirring spoon. Cut 23 two x two inch squares from the paper or cardboard and print these letter and letter combinations on the squares: ai, igh, y, ight, ang, ing, ong, ung, f, t, p, r, d, ch, q, n, l, b, s, h, sh, th, and k.

- 1 Place the letters into a pretend pot of soup.
- Players stir the letters. Each player takes a letter from the pot. Stir again. Each player takes another letter. When a player can make a word by putting his letters together, he makes the word and reads it out loud.
- 3 Continue stirring. Each player continues to take additional letters and make words.
- 3 The player with the most words at the end wins.

Words that can be made with these letters include tail, pail, gain, high, night, right, lights, bright, sight, shy, things, spring, rang, hung, song, and king.



# Word Cubes

This is a fun way to practice some sight words used in the story.



#### Materials:

# I Am Thinking

Blending letter sounds together helps children read new words.



- 1 Think of a person, place, or thing from the book.
- 2 Say, "I am thinking of a word from the book that starts with a 'k' sound (make the sound of the letter 'k'), and ends with the 'ing' sound (make the sound of 'ing' as in sing). What is the word?"

  The answer is king.
- 3 Use a variety of different words from the story. Present the first part of the word and then the second part of the word. It could be the first sound and then the rest of the word, or it could be the first syllable and then the second syllable.
- 4 Continue with additional words from the story. For variation, ask your child to take a turn and ask you to guess the word.

Appropriate words from the story include *bright, things, spring,* hanging, swinging, center, laughing, standing, pail, vanish, and song.

## Codes

Playing with letters is a wonderful way to reinforce letters and sounds.



#### **Materials:**


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**Option 2—Make Your Own:** You'll need paper and a pencil. On the sheet of paper write these "words" in code:

mhfgs, kztfg, szkdms, kdes, qhfgs, shfdq, rmzjd, rszfd

- 1 Your child can "break the code" by rewriting the words using the next letter in the alphabet. For example, the letter "d" becomes the letter "e." The letter "z" is used for the letter "a." If necessary, copy the alphabet on the top of the paper.
- 2 Answers are: night, laugh, talent, left, right, tiger, snake, stage
- 3 For more word play, try to write a sentence from the story in code, changing each letter to the next letter in the alphabet.
