OI HAVE STRONG EARS When you want to pinpoint a sound, you turn your whole head. Not nel With sixteen nascles each, ny ears can tarn in all directions—all by thenselves. My ears can hear altrasonic (very high-pitched) and infrasonic (very low) tones while you hear...only silence.
