
# Beliefs, thoughts, and actions

Change in one place can affect the whole world. Cancer research in one country helps patients everywhere. An oil spill pollutes water in many countries. In a global community, one person's actions can


affect people around the world. You can be the change in the world.

### Making change!

Ryan was in grade one when his teacher taught his class that some places in the world did not have clean drinking water. The polluted water was making thousands of children sick. Some children were even dying. A well would bring clean water to people who needed it. Ryan decided to take action. He made a plan to earn money to build a well. He did extra chores and talked to other people who helped raise money, too. One year later, Ryan had enough money to build a well in Uganda, a poor country in Africa. Ryan's cause grew into an organization called Ryan's Well Foundation. Together, Ryan and his foundation continue to build water wells in countries all over the world.

# What would you change?

Ideas for change can come from anywhere. Like Ryan, you might be at school when you learn about a problem. Or you could be at an after-school club. You might read about a problem in a book or see something on TV.

Think about what is important to you.

Talk to your friends and family and brainstorm ways you can work together to make a positive change.

Miguel is good at public speaking. He makes speeches about recycling.

Ashanti likes fundraising. She makes money selling lemonade, then donates it to disaster relief.

Carla is a good knitter. She makes scarves for families in need.

How can you find a problem you can change? Ask yourself:

What do you like to do? What are you good at? How can you use your skills to help others?

# Getting ready!



Once you find a problem, learn as much about it as you can.

You can also find an organization that is making a change. Ask how you can help. What is needed most? How many people need help? How can you learn more about the problem?

### Make an action plan!

An **action plan** helps you to decide what steps you need to take to reach your goal. It helps everyone who is helping know what they need to do, too. When everyone works together, your actions will make the biggest change!



#### Maria's Book Drive Action Plan

#### When:

November 14 to November 30

# It's time to see the change in action!

November 5 Put up posters for our book drive.

November 6 Call newspaper to let them know about our book drive.

November 7 Send a letter asking families to collect gently used books to donate.

November 12 Make an announcement. Remind students to bring in books.

November 14-30

Outside Ms. Stack's class

Bring in your gently loved books for kids in St. Lucia

November 14-30 Collect books at recess and lunch. Pack books into boxes.

December 3 OneWorld Schoolhouse will pick up books.

#### Don't give up!

Remember, sometimes things happen that you can't plan for. Maria should not be upset if she collects fewer books than she had hoped. She should remember why her change is important. It's okay to try again and ask for more help!

action plan (AK-shuhn plan) noun A list of steps that must be taken to complete a task

cause (KAWZ) noun A reason for action; something to support community (kuh-MYOO-ni-tee) noun A group of people living in an area, who often have similar interests

compassion (cuhm-PASH-uhn) noun A feeling of sympathy for others in distress and a strong desire to help

global community (GLOH-buhl kuh-MYOO-ni-tee) noun The people of the world connected by similar needs and cooperating to share resources such as clean water, air, and food

inspire (in-SPAHYUHR) verb

To encourage positive feelings in someone, making that person want to take action

organization (awr-guh-nuh-ZEY-shuhn) noun An association or group of people working together for a purpose

**rights** (RAHYTS) noun Things that a person should be allowed to have, get, or do

A noun is a person, place, or thing. A verb is an action word that tells you what someone or something does.
